

Armstrong & Charlie





Betty Before X



Black Heroes of the Wild West





Box: Henry Brown Mails Himself to Freedom



Ellington Was Not a Street



Finding Langston




Freedom Over Me: Eleven Slaves, Their Lives and Dreams Brought to Life




Harlem

Heart and Soul: The Story of America and African Americans



It All Comes Down to This





The Journey of Little Charlie



Let 'Er Buck! : George Fletcher, the People's Champion



This rollicking true tale of a cowboy’s epic rodeo ride will delight readers young and old.



Midnight Without a Moon






Traveling the Freedom Road: From Slavery & the Civil War Through Reconstruction

Twelve Days in May: Freedom Ride 1961




Who was Louis Armstrong?
