

by Lesa Cline-Ransome; illustrated by James E. Ransome



Big Papa and the Time Machine




Child of the Civil Rights Movement




Fearless Mary: Mary Fields, American Stagecoach Driver

Fifty Cents and a Dream: Young Booker T. Washington



Frederick Douglass: The Lion Who Wrote History




Goin' Someplace Special





Meet Miss Fancy




My Brother Martin: A Sister Remembers Growing Up with the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.


The Oldest Student: How Mary Walker Learned to Read


Aware of the fence that separates the black part of town from the white part, Clover is curious when a white girl suddenly comes around and sits on the fence day after day, so she decides to take the


Overground Railroad

The Secret Garden of George Washington Carver



Sing a Song: How "Lift Every Voice and Sing" Inspired Generations





This Jazz Man






A Voice Named Aretha


We March
