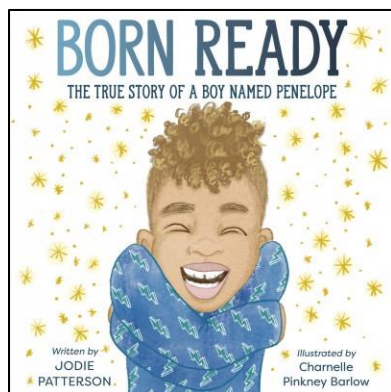


CHILDREN'S BOOKSLIST

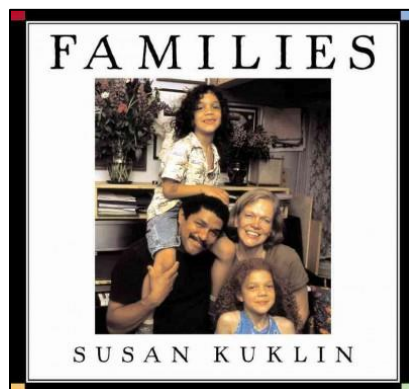
Born Ready: The True Story of a Boy Named Penelope

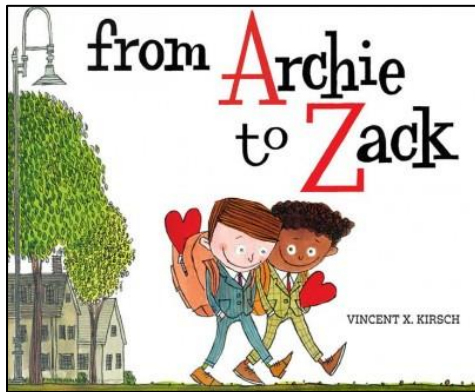

performance of a traditional kane hula chant, she wants to be part of it. But can a girl really lead the all-male troupe? Ho'onani has to try . . . Based on a true story, *Ho'onani: Hula Warrior* is a celebration of Hawaiian culture and an empowering story of a girl who learns to lead and learns to accept who she really is--and in doing so, gains the respect of all those around her.

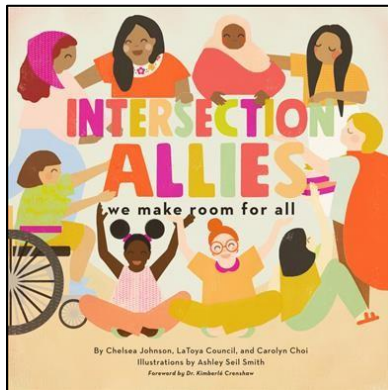


I am Jazz!

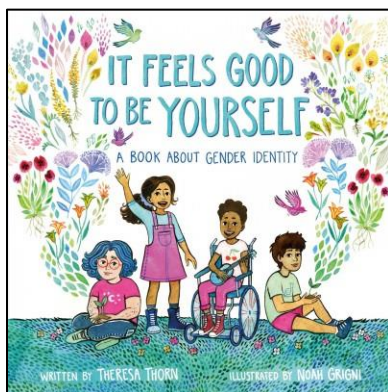
Intersection Allies: We Make Room for All

It Feels Good to Be Yourself: A Book About Gender Identity

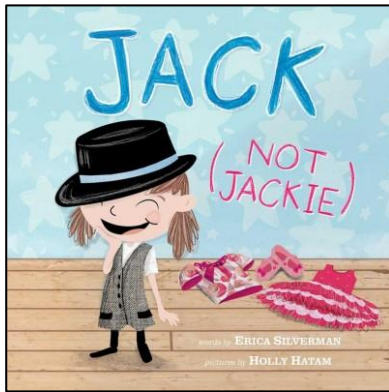

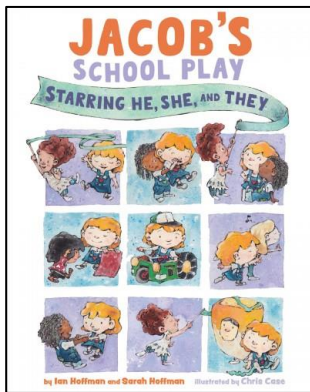
Jack (Not Jackie)

Jacob's School Play: Starring He, She, and They

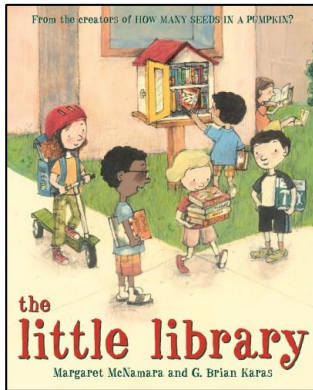

The Little Library

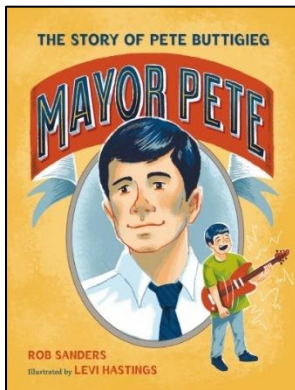

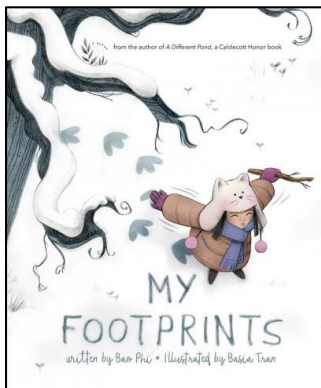

Through victories and defeats, and the changes that the seasons bring, the young boy from South Bend grew into a man devoted to helping others.

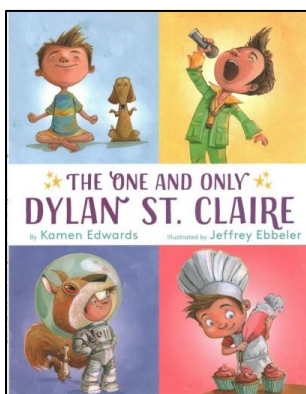

The One and Only Dylan St. Claire

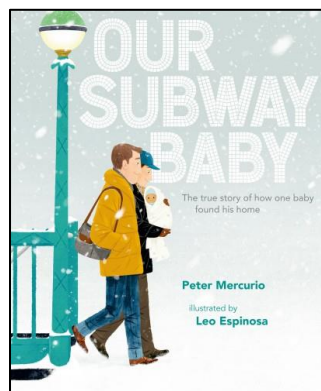

Our Subway Baby

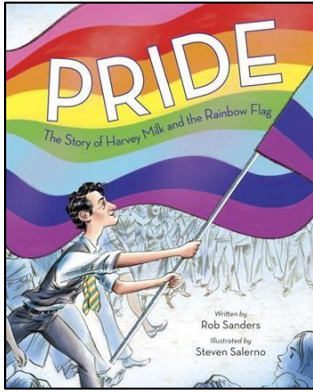

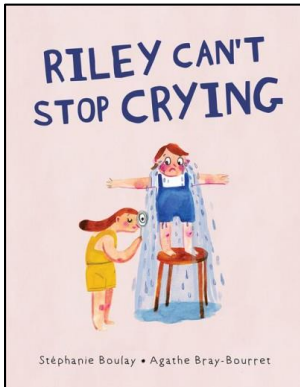
Pride: The Story of Harvey Milk and the Rainbow Flag

Riley Can't Stop Crying

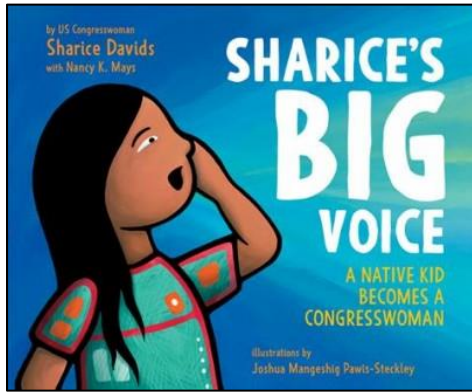

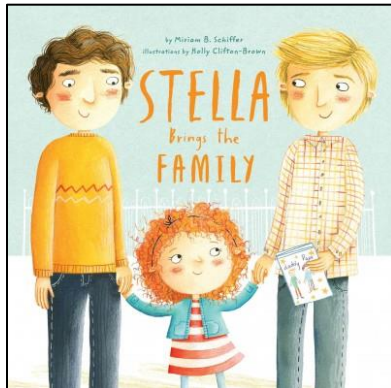
Sharice's Big Voice: A Native Kid Becomes a Congresswoman

Stella Brings the Family

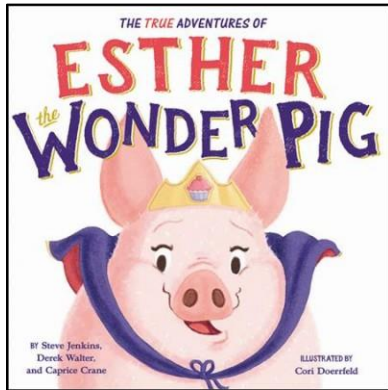

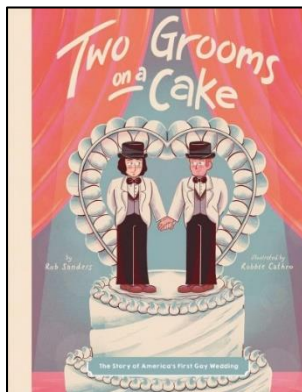
The True Adventures of Esther the Wonder Pig

Two Grooms on a Cake: The Story of America's First Gay Marriage

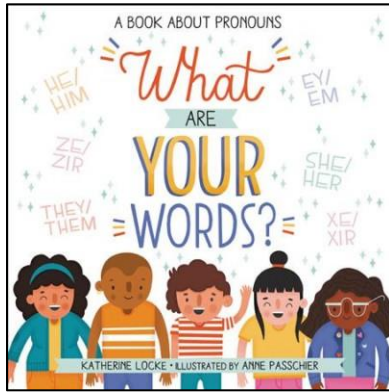

Long before marriage equality was the law of the land, two grooms stood on a wedding cake with their feet firmly planted in fluffy white frosting. That cake belonged to Jack Baker and Michael McConnell, who were wed on September 3, 1971, becoming the first same-sex couple in America to be legally married. Their struggle to obtain a marriage license in Minnesota and their subsequent appeals to the Minnesota Supreme Court and the Supreme Court of the United States is an under-told story of LGBT history. Comprehensive backmatter, including a marriage equality timeline, round out this heartwarming story.

What Are Your Words? : A Book About Pronouns

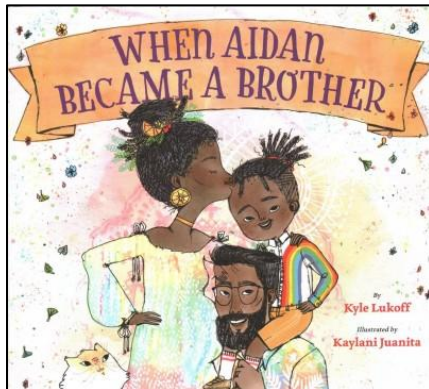
