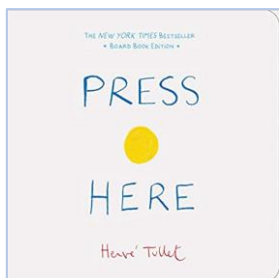
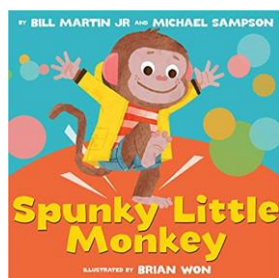


Books To Read With Your Toddler



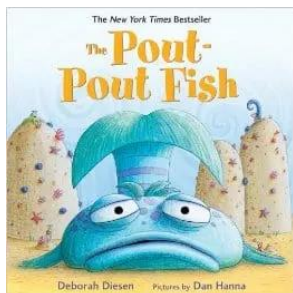
Press Here by Herve Tullet

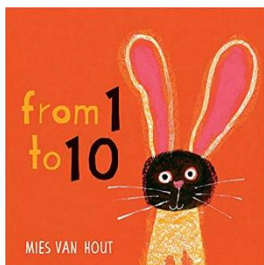
Spunky Little Monkey by Mill Martin Jr. and Michael Sampson

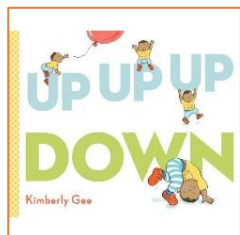
The Pout-Pout Fish by Deborah Diesen

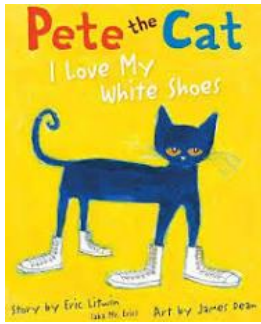
From 1 to 10 by Mies Van Hout

A bright and vivacious counting book for the very young featuring paintings rendered in bold hues that appeal to toddlers. Simple and straightforward for counting practice.



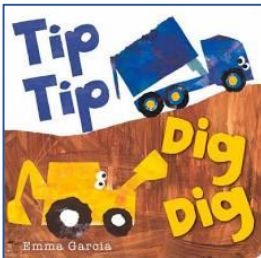
Up, Up, Up, Down by Kimberly Gee

Follow an energetic toddler's day with Dad that's full of opposites - up and down, make and break, yum and yuck, and more.



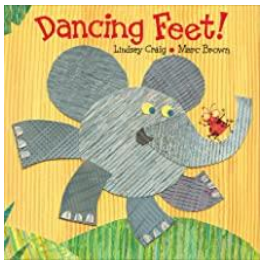
Pete the Cat I Love My White Shoes by Eric Litwin

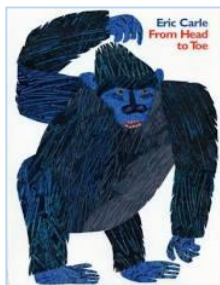
Tip Tip Dig Dig by Emma Garcia

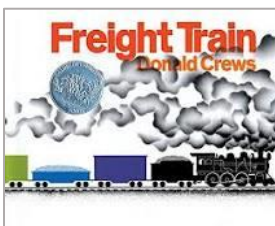
Dancing Feet by Lindsay Craig

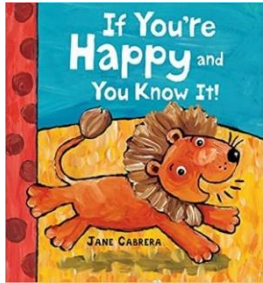
From Head to Toe by Eric Carle

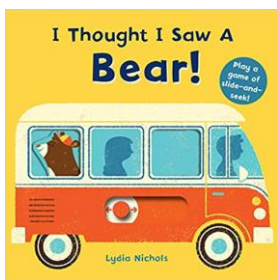
If You're Happy And You Know It! By Jane Cabrera

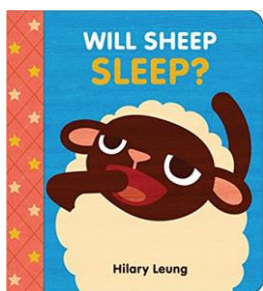
Where's the Ladybug? by Ingela P. Arrhenius

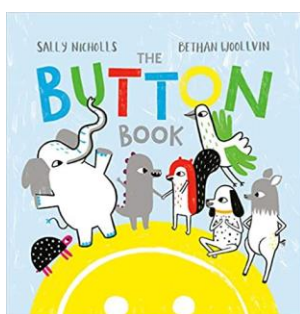
I Thought I Saw a Bear! by Lydia Nichols

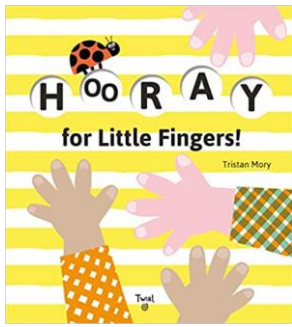
Will Sheep Sleep? By Hilary Leung

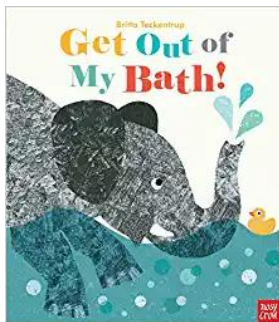
The Button Book by Sally Nicholls

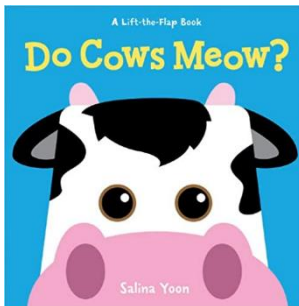
Hooray for Little Fingers by Tristan Mory

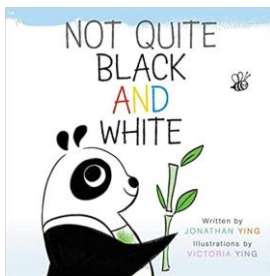
Get Out of My Bath! by Britta Teckentrup

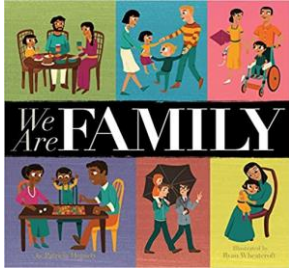
Do Cows Meow? By Salina Yoon

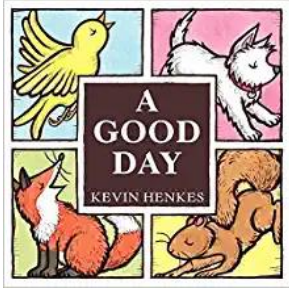
Not Quite Black And White by Jonathan Ying

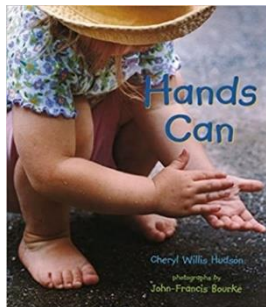
A Good Day by Kevin Henkes

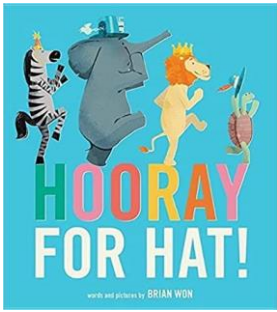
Little Owl Lost by Chris Haughton

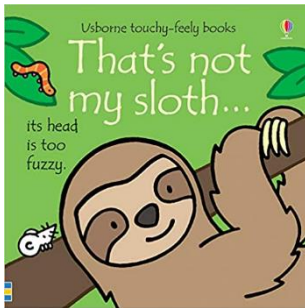
Hands Can by Cheryl Willis Hudson
