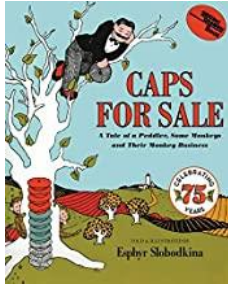


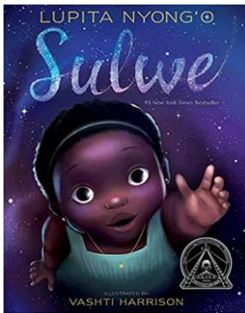


# Books To Read With Your Preschooler

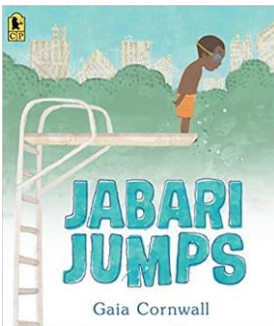
## Sulwe by Lupita Nyong'o

## Bark, George! by Jules Feiffer

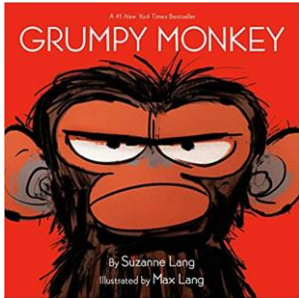

## Jabari Jumps by Gaia Cornwall

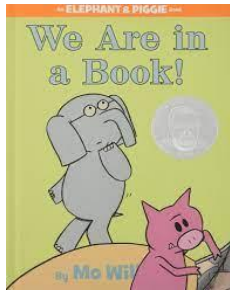

In a sweetly appealing tale of overcoming your fears, Gaia Cornwall captures a moment between a patient and encouraging father and a determined little boy you can't help but root for.



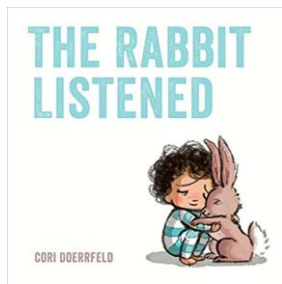
### Grumpy Monkey by Suzanne Lang

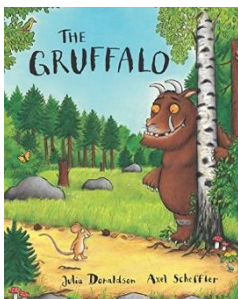
### We Are in a Book! and all the Elephant and Piggie books by Mo Willems

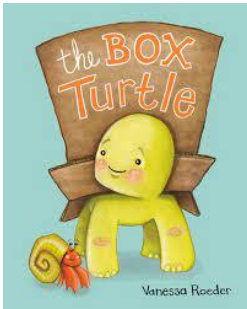
### The Gruffalo by Julie Donaldson

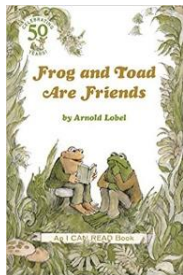
### Best Day Ever by Marilyn Singer

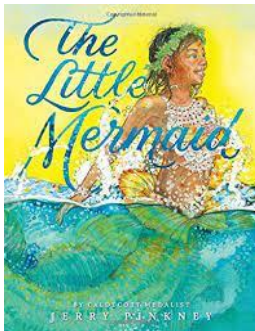
### The Box Turtle by Vanessa Roeder

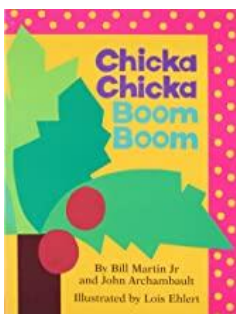
### Frog and Toad Are Friends by Arnold Lobel

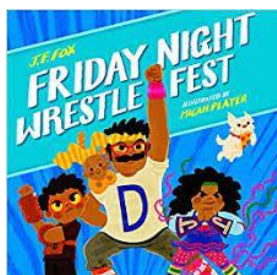
### The Little Mermaid by Jerry Pinkney

### Chicka Chicka Boom Boom by Bill Martin Jr. and John Archambault

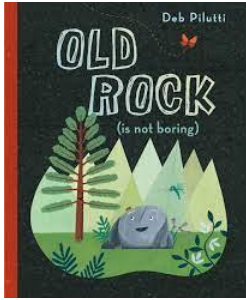

### Friday Night Wrestle Fest by J.F. Fox

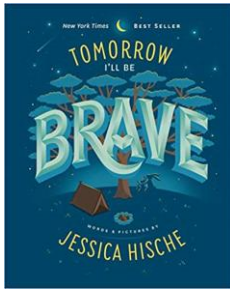

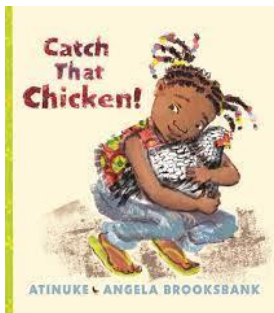
### Old Rock (Is Not Boring) by Deb Pilutti

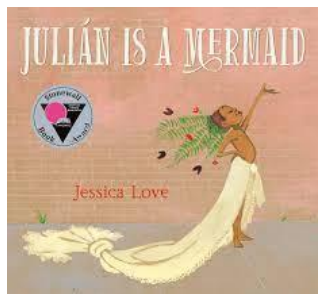
### Tomorrow I'll Be Brave by Jessica Hische

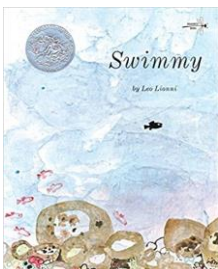
### Catch That Chicken by Atinuke

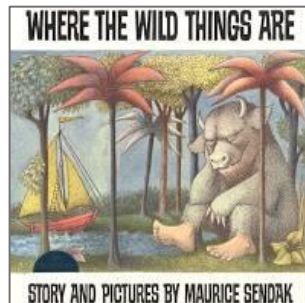
### Swimmy by Leo Lionni

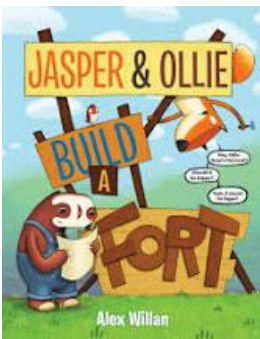
### A Small Kindness by Stacy McAnulty

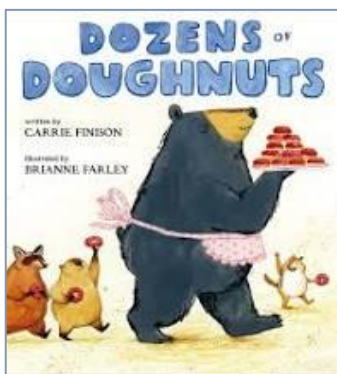
### Where the Wild Things Are by Maurice Sendak

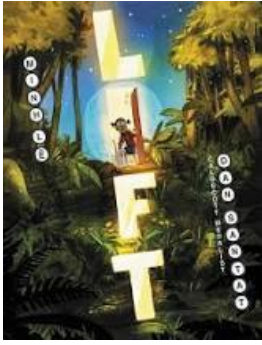
### Jasper and Ollie Build a Fort by Alex Willan

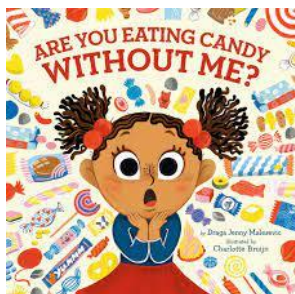
### When Grandma Gives You a Lemon Tree by Jamie L.B. Deenihan

### The Snowy Day by Ezra Jack Keats

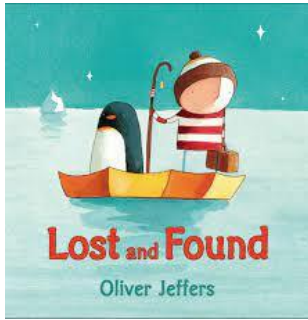

### Are You Eating Candy Without Me? By Draga Jenny Malesevic

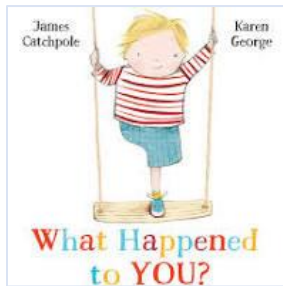

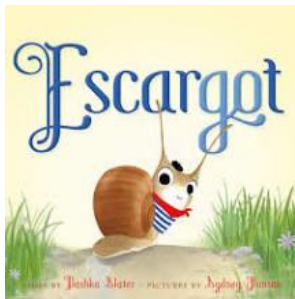


### What Happened to YOU? by James Catchpole

A ground-breaking, funny story that helps children understand what it might feel like to be seen as different.

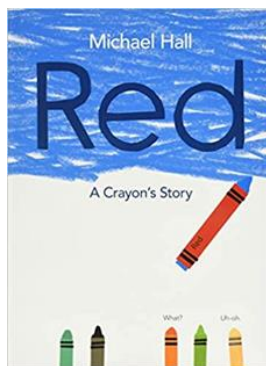


### Escargot by Dashka Slater

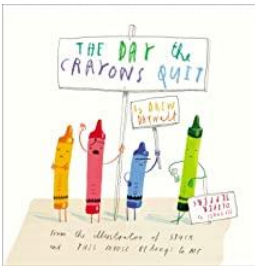
### Hello, Rain! By Kyro Maclear and Chris Turnham

### The Day the Crayons Quit by Drew Daywalt

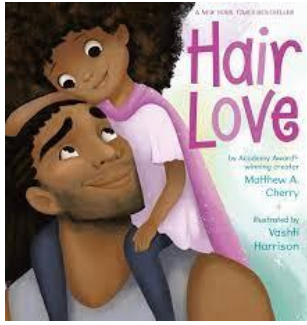

### Stellaluna by Janell Cannon

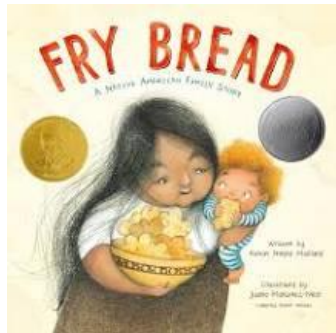

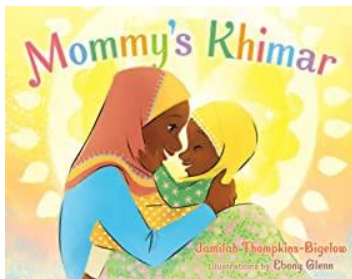
### Hair Love by Matthew A. Cherry

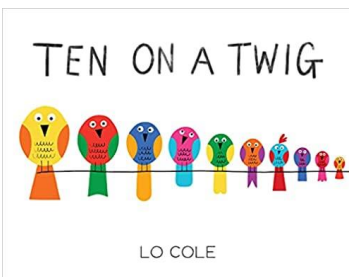
### Fry Bread A Native American Family Story by Kevin Noble Maillard

It is a celebration of old and new, traditional and modern, similarity and difference.



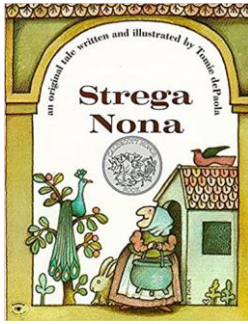
### Mommy's Khimar by Jamilah Thompkins-Bigelow

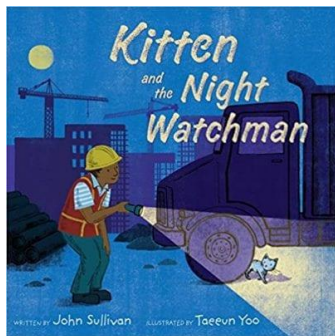
### Strega Nona by Tomie De Paola

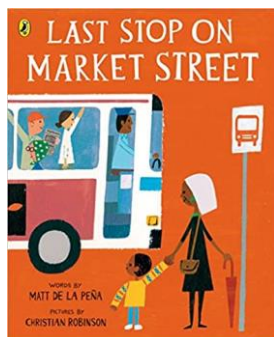


### Kitten and the Night Watchman by John Sullivan

*The night watchman hugs his wife and kids and drives to work. All night he is alone.*

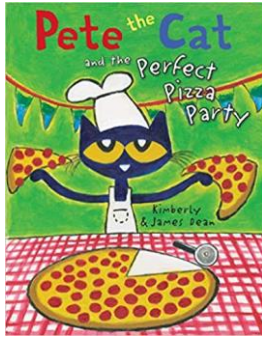
*Every hour he makes his rounds.*

### Last Stop on Market Street by Matt De La Peña

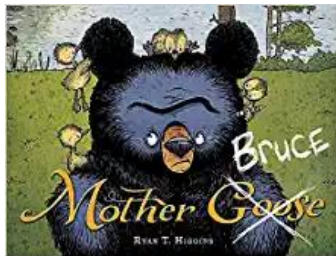

Pete the Cat and the Perfect Pizza Party by Kimberly & James Dean

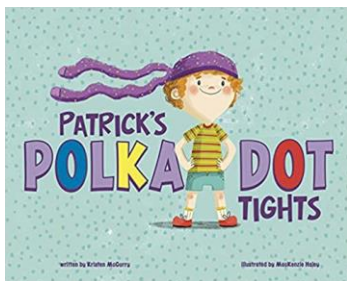
*It's a party, a party, a perfect pizza party!*

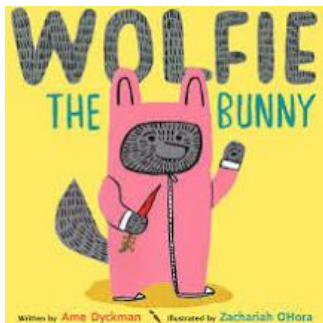
Mother Bruce by Ryan T. Higgins

Patrick's Polka Dot Tights by Kristen McCurry

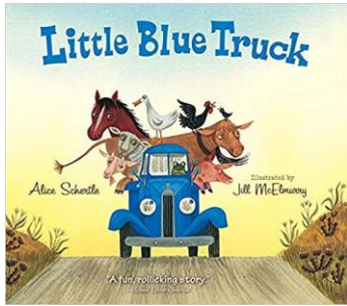

Wolfie the Bunny by Anne Dyckman

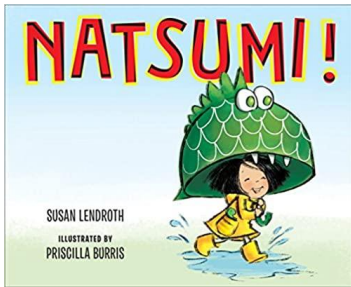
